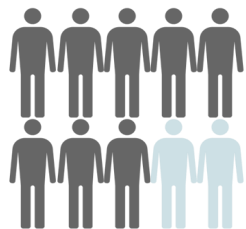
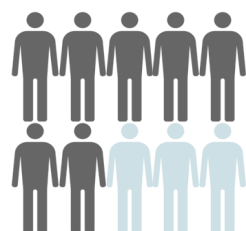


# Mississippi Respondents Struggle to Afford Health Care: Selected Results from the Consumer Health Care Experience State Survey (CHES)



**84%**

reported being “worried” or “very worried” about affording some aspect of health care in the future.



**72%**

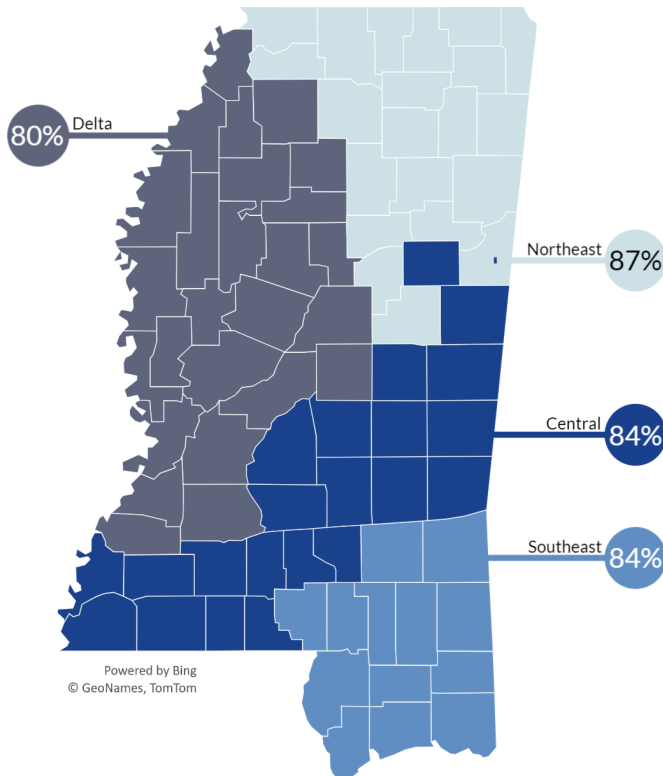
experienced at least one health care affordability burden in the past year.

**90% of respondents agreed that they believe the government should show what a fair price would be for specific procedures**, including 93% of Republican respondents, 88% of Democrat respondents, and 88% of unaffiliated respondents.

**89% of respondents agreed that the government should require drug companies to provide advance notice of price increases and information to justify those increases**, including 91% of Republican respondents, 89% of Democrat respondents, and 87% of unaffiliated respondents.

**88% of respondents agreed that they believe the government should make it easy to switch insurers if a health plan drops your doctor**, including 89% of Republican respondents, 91% of Democrat respondents, and 85% of unaffiliated respondents.

**88% of respondents agreed that they believe the government should cap out-of-pocket costs for life saving medications, such as insulin**, including 89% of Republican respondents, 89% of Democrat respondents, and 85% of unaffiliated respondents.

**88% of respondents agreed that they believe the government should require hospitals and doctors to provide up-front cost estimates to consumers**, including 90% of Republican respondents, 89% of Democrat respondents, and 84% of unaffiliated respondents.
