
Tennessee Respondents Struggle to Afford Health Care:



Percent who **went without care due to cost** in the past twelve months, by region:




61%

88% of respondents said that they believe the government should require drug companies to provide advance notice of price increases and information to justify those increases, including 85% of Republican respondents, 89% of Democrat respondents, and 88% of unaffiliated respondents.

91% of respondents agreed that the government should make it easier to switch insurers if a health plan drops your doctor, including 90% of Republican respondents, 91% of Democrat respondents, and 92% of unaffiliated respondents.

89% of respondents said that they believe the government should show what a fair price would be for specific procedures, including 87% of Republican respondents, 90% of Democrat respondents, and 92% of unaffiliated respondents.

86% of respondents said that they believe the government should set standard prices for prescription drugs to make them affordable, including 82% of Republican respondents, 90% of Democrat respondents, and 89% of unaffiliated respondents.

89% of respondents said that they believe the government should require insurers to provide upfront cost estimates to consumers, including 90% of Republican respondents, 89% of Democrat respondents, and 90% of unaffiliated respondents.
